¹ The rates reflected in the table apply to a "Canadian-controlled private corporation" ("CCPC").

² The small business rates apply to a CCPC which earns active business income that is eligible for the small business deduction ("SBD"). Different rates apply for business income eligible for the zero-emission technology manufacturing deduction and are not reflected in this table.

³ The small business rates can only be applied to income up to the "business limit" for a taxation year. The "business limit" must be shared amongst CCPCs that are "associated" for income tax purposes. The available "business limit" for an associated group can be reduced in certain circumstances. A description of these rules is beyond the scope of this reference card.

⁴ Included in the "Investment Income" rates is a 30.67% refundable tax. The refundable tax is recovered by the corporation when sufficient taxable dividends are paid to shareholders.

⁵ "Canadian Dividends" refers to dividends paid from Canadian corporations and from foreign affiliates. This corporate tax on Canadian dividends is fully refundable to the corporation upon paying sufficient taxable dividends to shareholders, as described in footnote 4.

⁶ A Nova Scotia CCPC benefits from provincial small business rates on eligible income up to \$700,000 (compared to \$500,000 in all other jurisdictions). Income in excess of the \$500,000 Federal business limit, but below the \$700,000 Nova Scotia business limit will be taxed at the Federal general rate of 15.00%, plus the relevant Nova Scotia small business rate.

⁷ SBD rate is set to decrease from 3.20% to 2.20% on Jul 1, 2026.

⁸ A Prince Edward Island CCPC benefits from provincial small business rates on eligible income up to \$600,000 (compared to \$500,000 in all other jurisdictions). Income in excess of the \$500,000 Federal business limit, but below the \$600,000 Prince Edward Island business limit will be taxed at the Federal general rate of 15.00%, plus the relevant Prince Edward Island small business rate.

⁹ SBD rate is set to decrease from 3.20% to 2.20% on Apr 30, 2026.

¹⁰ A Saskatchewan CCPC benefits from provincial small business rates on eligible income up to \$600,000 (compared to \$500,000 in all other jurisdictions). Income in excess of the \$500,000 Federal business limit, but below the \$600,000 Saskatchewan business limit will be taxed at the Federal general rate of 15.00%, plus the relevant Saskatchewan small business rate.
